

COPY OF GUARANTEE TO BARBER.

Contract with B. H. Carmany's party of four for hunting season of 1920. I Owsen, H. Barber, Galden and Cuddeback located at White Horse, Y. T. Canada agree to take B. H. Carmany of Alberta, Wyoming and three friends on hunting trip in Yukon territory and Alaska, in season of 1920 for the sum of seventy-five hundred dollars and I Owsen, H. Barber to furnish everything for said trip and pay all expenses of trip from time we leave on trip until we return from trip. Trip to be fifty days.

Owsen, H. Barber to furnish horses, guides, horse wrangler, provisions, cook, tents, stoves, tables, chairs, cooking utensils and dishes and all things that are needed for the use and comfort of trip.

B. H. Carmany and party of furnish whips and guns, ammunition, hunting license, beds and personal belongings.

B. H. Carmany and party to advance to Owsen, H. Barber, one of the seventy-five hundred dollars, two thousand dollars, as security money for the trip. If any thing happens to B. H. Carmany and party to prevent them from coming or taking the trip the two thousand dollars is to go to Charles H. Barber, as a guarantee for his services and outfit.

This is a guarantee to B. H. Carmany and party for their two thousand dollars, advance money that if any thing should happen to Owsen, H. Barber, Owsen or Galden, or for any unknown reason that would prevent him from taking B. H. Carmany and party on said trip that B. H. Carmany and party shall have full power of attorney to sell my outfit and pay themselves back the two thousand dollars advance money to me if they can't collect it through the Canadian Bank of Commerce of White Horse, Yukon Territory, Canada.

Enclosed please find draft for your order for \$1,000 United States dollars, also the certificate. You will note I have made a few slight changes in the certificate, but they are only extracting the amount for a party of two or three and I think you will not object to the change in the contract if you are willing to take the party of two or three.

As to the investment job I have never tried to get the other parties to come out on with the deposit. But I had counted on you have looked at with me, and I am sure you that I have looked my best to get them to come, however I have found one that is right there with the money. I am asking you to take four of us at seventy-five hundred dollars.

Either this will get us all fixed up on the hunting trip with you into the Yukon and Alaska. Please sign the contract and return in the copy.

How if we bring you a party of four the other men will mail you their money or deposits.


Dear Sir:

There is one thing in the way of your making the trip and that is I will have to find the fourth man, however, I think I can do this easily from the number of letters I am receiving, so if you would go, would advise that you wire me quick, also, send your draft to me, made payable to Chas H. Baxter, White Horse, Yukon Territory, Canada. For your money you will have a receipt showing what it is paid out for and also a contract for the hunting trip.

Dear Sir:

Your letter to hand. Replying to same I am enclosing copy of  
Baxter's contract and some other letters. By aid of this letter  
think you will fully understand everything.

I have sent <sup>an</sup> my telegrams to Mr. Baxter and received several  
from him. I think that he is a very popular guide and outfitter.  
I am told by several that have hunted that country that he is as  
good as the best up there.

The contract will show just what it costs each man that goes.  
Mr. Graham the other man here at Riverton that will go with me  
is planning together with myself to get a couple of good bear dogs  
to take on the trip, for we've really want to get some good big old  
grizzlies.

I live here at Riverton close to the big game section of this  
country and I have done quite a bit of big game hunting here, have  
killed mountain sheep, elk, deer, etc; but not any moose. I see  
moose on every trip but the season is closed on them here.

When I contracted with Mr. Baxter, I had a party of four or  
had it arranged so there would be a party of four. Mr. Lewis Jones  
of the Jones Brothers Taxidermy firm of Denver wanted to go and said  
that he had a man in view that would go but later it turned out that  
Mr. Jones got married and could not go, so that put us short two men,  
hence the little advertisement in Outdoor Life.

We would leave here around the 15th or 20th of July to be gone  
from seventy-five to ninety days. I think the trip will cost each  
man about twenty-five hundred dollars. I live on the Chicago and  
Northwestern R. R. 28 miles from Bonnevile Wyoming. Bonnevile is  
on the G.B. & Q. R.Y. the direct route to Seattle. I doubt if you  
will be able to find Riverton on your maps, although we have a fine  
little town of about 3000. If you take the trip get a round trip  
ticket with stop offs allowed and I will meet you in Bonnevile,  
and show you around a little out here and take you up to Dabols, 100  
miles up the Big Wind River. Dabols is right up in the mountains  
and in the heart of the big game country of Wyoming.

In our hunt to Yukon, we would hunt on both sides, that is in  
Yukon and in Alaska. This way we would be allowed to kill about  
25 trophies each. 4 moose, 4 Caribou, 4 sheep and 6 goats. I believe  
this is the correct number. Then all the bear we see and I want to  
see some of them. On the Alaskan side we are not allowed to kill but  
two bear, I believe.

I have done quite a bit of Taxidermy work and would see that  
our trophies were properly cared for while in the hunting country.  
Then I have done quite a bit of picture business and have a very  
fine camera.

When we get to the hunting country we can go out by McCarthy,  
Alaska, at no additional expense if we wish.



Now if you want to go send Barber a draft for \$1000. That is \$500 for each of you. You will understand that this is a guarantee that you will go. Mr. Graham and myself have sent one thousand to him. You might make the draft payable to Barber and send it to me. I would forward it right on to him, also, advise him by telegraph that I had done so. Now if you go I will furnish you with a complete list of what I will take for myself and believe it would be about O. K. for any one on such a trip.

I have ordered a complete set of Maps of that country and if you wish can get a set for you.

If you will go send the draft payable to Barber, or send it direct to him and telegraph me that you have done so, so that I will not close with some other party. I am receiving several letters and will close with some one within a few days, if you wire me that you will go I will not contract with any other parties.
